- 4. **The Bible Unearthed** by Israel Finkelstein and Neil Asher Silberman, The Free Press (Simon & Schuster), 2001 (ISBN 0-684-86912-8) [A growing but controversial concept that states that the archeological evidence denies the existence of kings David and Solomon.]
- 5. **Secret Origins of the Bible** by Tim Callahan, Millennium Press, 2002 (ISBN 0-9655047-8-6)) [Traces many of the stories in the Bible to earlier myths.]
- 6. **Who wrote the Gospels?** by Randel McCraw Helms, Millennium Press, 2000 (ISBN 0-9655047-2-7) [Similar treatment of 4 New Testament Gospels.]
- 7. **Mythology's Last Gods: Yahweh and Jesus** by William Harwood, Prometheus Books, 1992 (ISBN 0-87975-742-6) [Dissertation research by Dr. Harwood. Similar to the Callahan book in that it traces Bible stories to earlier myths. But makes even a stronger claim that essentially all of it is myth.]
