Course Overview: Theoretical models of computation, formal grammars and languages, and their relationships. Classifying languages by the mechanisms needed to parse them.

Prerequisites: CMSC 250 and 351. Students are expected to know the basic concepts of discrete mathematics such as simple logic, proof by induction, basic set theory, relations and functions, and equivalence classes.

Course Work: Course work consists of homework assignments (about every week and a half) and two exams (a midterm and final). Homeworks are due by the start of class on the due date. You may discuss general course material and homework problems with classmates, but you should do the homework problems yourself. Assignments are to be written up neatly. The clarity and conciseness of your presentation will count in the grading of homeworks and exams.

Grading: Final grades will be based on homework assignments, a midterm exam, and a comprehensive final exam. The relative weights of these will be approximately 20% for the homework total, 35% for of the midterm, and 45% for the final exam.
